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SouthPAN Satellite Dish at Uralla Completed



Lockheed Martin Australia and Av-Comm complete installation of SouthPAN's first satellite dish URALLA, 1 December 2023 – Lockheed Martin Australia, together with industry partner Av-Comm, has successfully completed the installation of the inaugural satellite dish for the Southern Positioning Augmentation Network (SouthPAN) in Uralla. This marks a significant achievement for the SouthPAN project, a collaborative initiative between Geoscience Australia and Toitū Te Whenua Land Information New Zealand designed to deliver Satellite-Based Augmentation System services to Australia, New Zealand and maritime regions.

In September 2022, Lockheed Martin Australia was awarded a \$1.18 billion contract to enhance precise positioning within the SouthPAN service areas. In December 2022, Lockheed Martin Australia selected New

South Wales company Av-Comm to establish a network of ground station uplink facilities for SouthPAN. The completion of the first 11-metre satellite dish, with a control centre and dual radio frequency uplinks, now promises to refine positioning accuracy to as little as ten centimetres – in doing so, revolutionising positioning across Australia with benefits across agriculture, aviation, construction, consumer, resource, road, rail, maritime, mining, utilities, and more.

Warren McDonald, Chief Executive Lockheed Martin Australia and New Zealand, stated, "The successful deployment of SouthPAN's first satellite dish represents a leap forward in positioning technology and a testament to the ingenuity and commitment of our Australian team. By enabling accuracy down to as little as ten centimetres, we're not just enhancing positioning services, we're revolutionising how industries operate and how emergency services respond across the region".

Lockheed Martin Australia's Regional Director for Space, David Ball, said, "The SouthPAN project is a key example Continued on page 3

The dishes arrive in 40 foot containers and go together like large Meccano sets. Six months ago I attended a sod turning at the site. The system when up and running will have enormous benefits for aviation and agriculture. On a beautiful Uralla afternoon I was able to highlight the CSIRO research station and New England Solar Farm as Uralla leading the nation in technology. The Construction Project Manager paid special tribute to the quality of the local concrete and electrical tradesmen. Hats off to Dillon's concrete and Neal Howard's Electrical. One other exciting bit of news is that Lockheed Martin are looking to employ a new staff member on a traineeship. If anyone wants to work with cutting edge technology, this opportunity should not be missed.

Uralla Shire Council's 2022-23 Audited Financial Statements have been placed on public display. The auditors will present their report at our last meeting on Tuesday December 19. With income of \$31,413,000 and expenses of \$27,329,000 the operating result from continuing operations was \$4,084,000. The net operating result before grants and contributions provided for capital purposes is minus \$1,129,000, (proving we continue to do well in obtaining grants). I would like to congratulate Council staff on receiving

One of the challenges for the Shire with the proposed renewable energy development is housing. A recent study

showed that available rental accommodation in Uralla fell to zero over the last eighteen months. 3% is considered a good balance for different types of housing options. I understand this is now over 4%, however the next round of solar farm construction is planned to commence in the next six months. A number of Councillors and staff recently attended a Congratulations to SouthPan and Lockheed Martin on the workshop in Armidale, organised by Community Power Agency and Orange Compass, to better understand the challenges and the opportunities. We were reminded that social and affordable housing are usually the first to suffer. The first step for Council is to develop a housing strategy. While we have applied for a grant for this work we may need to explore other funding options. A question for the community is whether the preference is for separate worker accommodation, short term modular housing or long term higher standard modular housing, which will provide legacy benefits into the future. We are all aware that unless we can encourage industry to locate to the region, the enormous peak of workers will be followed by a rapid decline. You know the country is weird when a renewable energy project in North West Tasmania is being opposed by the Bob Brown



Armidale and Uralla to

Benefit from Better Bus

Network

A revamped bus network, which includes the introduction of seven-day-a-week connections between the University of New England (UNE) and Armidale station, is set to roll out from Monday 11 December.

The new network will introduce 23 extra bus services each week for North Hill and South Hill in Armidale – as well as new Sunday and public holiday services for Armidale and Uralla.

Other benefits include:

- improved access to the Armidale Hospital precinct
- better connections to the UNE from North Hill and South Hill
- daily connections between UNE and Armidale Station for the first time
- better access between TAFE and Armidale Central shops with North Hill, South Hill and Uralla
- improved services to Armidale Airport, and
- improved access to bus services for residents of Autumn Lodge aged care centre.

Additional bus services to Uralla that were introduced in 2020 will be retained following positive community feedback and usage.

Transport for NSW has developed the new bus network based on consultation with local communities and by working closely with Armidale Regional Council, Uralla Shire Council and Edwards' Coaches.

Old friends flock back to New England Solar

New England Solar has welcomed a large mob of Merinos back to the fields around its solar arrays, with the new grass a welcome and tasty treat for our grazing tenants.

Around 2,000 sheep and lambs have been grazing the grass underneath and around the solar panels, helping to reduce vegetation on site and manage bushfire risks.

The practice of sheep and solar farms coexisting is known as solar grazing, and a number of trials both in Australia and overseas have shown that solar panels help to keep grass green and maintain good growth, providing a much sought after feed stock.

The panels also provide shade and protection from the hot sun for the sheep, as well as protection for new born lambs from aerial predators.

Plans are now underway for our host landholders to release another 3,000 sheep across the Stage 1 solar farm site over the coming months.



New England Solar bursting with clean renewable energy

Generation from New England Solar Stage 1 has ramped up to full capacity this month, with the solar generation peaking at around 400 megawatts over the past week.

The Stage 1 project has a name plate rating of 400 MW, with work on the 320 MW Stage 2 project expected to kick start next year.

With their help, we have finished the year on a huge high with the Stage 1 project reaching full generation capacity.
