Not everyone is aware that Uralla Shire occupies a very significant position in the international world of lace. To wit: we have a very important lace collection on permanent display at McCrossin's Mill, we have a very active New England Lace Group headquartered in Kentucky, and we have internationally renowned lace experts living in the shire. The Foundry's lace is another matter.

Spaces Make Lace (The Janice Jones Lace Collection) at McCrossin's Mill was previously housed at the Powerhouse Museum in Sydney, but found a home in Uralla in 2022 as a result of the uncertainty surrounding the future of the Powerhouse Museum.

And occasionally, there is a celebration of this love of lace. So it was that a week ago a number of events took place in Uralla focusing on the beauty and artistry of lace, the largest of which was the Lace For Everyone Fashion Parade and dinner, held on Friday evening 3 November at The Alternate Root. This event attracted lace lovers from all over Australia to enjoy a lace-themed fashion show consisting of historical items of lace, normally only displayed behind glass at the Museum; of reimagined, handmade and upcycled garments, many of which were provided by Uralla Co-op; and of new fashions from Uralla and Walcha boutiques: Bling N Things, Melrose. Paperdolls House, The New Birds Boutique, White Ivy, Mumma D Designs, Little Birdy, Wild Kimono, Uralla Wool Room, and Emporium On Derby. The fashion models, all locals, put on a great parade.

Musical entertainment was provided by local band The Rocky Bottom Girls, who excelled as usual.

Great news with the announcement that Uralla Shire Council will receive \$2,353,990 under the Regional Emergency Road Repair Fund. This funding is for maintenance and repair work. Council has until 2027 to spend the money, which will allow detailed planning to ensure we get the best bang for our buck. Thanks to the Hon. Jenny Aitchison MP, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, and our local MP, Hon. Adam Marshall. Council is looking to appoint a project manager on a term position for this and other grant funds, to oversee these programs.

A huge shout out to the organisers and all involved in this year's Thunderbolts Festival. All the volunteer groups reported a very positive outcome. The crowd was tremendous and a special thanks to those on traffic control. As you can imagine, I found it challenging to open the festival after Hemlock's performance that involved axes, rabbit traps and plenty of spine-tingling action. The Antiques and Collectable Fair on November 18 and 19 promises to be a lot more sedate.

To all the young and the young at heart, it is time to spruce up your fairy outfits for what promises to be another wonderful Fairy Festival on Saturday December 2. Keep an eye out for the workshops and fun-filled events programmed. Council will continue to liaise with the Engagement Officer, Net Zero Transport, Office of Energy and Climate Change.



Introducing... Jill and Yoshi Kashima and Wild Kimono

Uralla is full of surprises, and the shop 'Wild Kimono' in the old NAB bank building is certainly one of them!

Owners Jill and Yoshi Kashima arrived from Sydney 20 years ago, although Jill had been in the area in the '70s doing post-grad at UNE before moving to Japan in 1979. There she found herself smitten by the beauty and variety of silk kimono, spending much time – and salary – collecting lovely old pieces and posting them to friends back home. Convinced that vintage kimono silk could be remade into more wearable western garments without compromising its uniqueness, the next step was to return to Australia and open a shop in Paddington, then a studio in Surry Hills.

"Our 'Wild Kimono' business in Uralla isn't an attempt to reproduce what we did there" says Jill, "but to pass on the residue of all those sewing-years into the busy hands of more do-ers and makers up here". There are lots of off-cuts of all colours and weaves for the quilters, as well as authentic jackets and full length kimono for either wearing or wall display.

"We're certainly a novelty here" Jill continues. "We get a lot of people coming in just to look at the old bank and doing a double-take. Other retailers along the street have been friendly and supportive, though momentum was lost when we closed for a while to concentrate on getting a website up."

The shop is now open for just two days each week, Fridays and Saturdays, which gives Jill time to work on her other great love – conserving biodiversity on the property where she and Yoshi live on the river at Retreat. "Like everyone" she says, "we've fingers crossed to avoid a bad fire season this summer. If all goes well, I'll be able to devote a whole lot more time to being in the shop leading into Christmas. A few other local makers will join us so we'll be able to open every day after the Fairy Festival, and inject a bit more fun and colour onto the Shady Side of the street!"

\$2.35 MILLION CASH FOR URALLA SHIRE ROAD UPGRADES

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has announced a \$2,353,990 funding shot-in-the-arm for Uralla Shire Council to repair and upgrade more of its local roads.

Mr Marshall made the announcement alongside Uralla Shire Mayor Robert Bell, on Kingstown Road, near Uralla, a stretch of road that will benefit from the funding boost.

"This is great news for council and the community, allowing more important local roads to be brought up to scratch, enhancing safety for all motorists and road users, Council has been playing repair catch up on many roads around the Uralla Shire in recent times and today's extra funding will mean they can undertake some major work to rebuild roads and do more gravel resheeting. The cash will not only help take some financial pressure off council, but as council has complete discretion where to spend the funds, it's going to be spent where it's needed most."

Mayor Robert Bell welcomed the announcement and said he appreciated the support from the State Government.

"Council roads were severely impacted by the significant flooding experienced in 2022 and our community is still suffering the effects. This funding is welcome and it will enable council to accelerate our road repair program across the affected communities without reducing other key works.

"Council appreciates the continued support of our local member Adam Marshall and the State Government in supporting our community in these vital funding programs."

Council received the funding under the Regional Emergency Road Repair Fund with funding allocated based on the size of their local road network.



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

Book Review Stone Yard Devotional by Charlotte Wood

(Alan and Unwin 2023)



This book is a bitter pill to swallow as we follow our unnamed narrator's life in a small Catholic monastic community on the Monaro Plains. She, a 60 ish woman has

left a marriage and a professional career to live with a motley group of mostly middle aged Catholic female monastics.

She moves into her simple room and finds sanctity in the bareness and silence. This bareness is mirrored in the desolation of the Monaro plains and in this landscape the starkness of their lives is accentuated. Charlotte Wood does not hold back with the gruesome details of the mouse plague that features as just one of the many details of living they have to deal with. And this mouse plague is smelly to the point of being a demonic entity that takes a lot of energy in the constant need for extermination and dealing with the dead ones. The only male character in the book assists them eventually by getting a digger for a significant sized hole.

There is a lot of ugliness in this book, the grass is dusty, the ugly plastic flowers at her parents grave shoved into a grate. Wood is the master of a forensic accuracy in being able to describe the everyday and show the reader to look again at something we most probably missed.

She creates clever tensions between characters the unspoken words and when they are spoken they come out wrong or not received in the way they were intended. Her characters seem to do their own bidding and there is sometimes a sense of disappointment in the realisation they aren't going to behave in the way we think they should.

Woods language is spare and forthright and seems to add to the macabre black comedy in the return of Sister Jenny in skeletal form ceremoniously brought back to the convent by a childhood nemesis who is also a fellow monastic and is both feared and admired.

There is a great deal of honest and painful reflection as characters grapple with their relationships to each other, to memories, and to the bones of sister Jenny.

I really enjoyed the depth and slow detail of this book.

She pulled her nightshirt from under her pillow, only to hear a solid thud on the dirt floor below. With candle she shone the floor to find a small black velvet drawstring purse. Its weight was solid and when its contents were tipped onto the cot, jewellery, loose gems, pieces of gold and coins made a small pile. Nell was stunned, looking at the loot for a moment.
