Robert Bell was elected Mayor of Uralla Shire Council in December 2021, after serving five years as a Councillor. He was previously Director of Engineering for Uralla Shire Council, lives in town, and has a grazing block at Kentucky. Clr Bell gives a personal view of some of the more important matters concerning Council and ratepayers in recent weeks.

Congratulations to Uralla Wordsworth on its 100th edition. I would like to acknowledge the volunteer editors and the wonderful support from those who advertise and make it all possible.

Great Lockheed news for the Martin Satellite Communications Facility at Uralla, with Geoscience Australia awarding the local arm of Lockheed Martin a \$1.18billion, 19 year contract to help implement the Southern Positioning Augmentation Network. This contract aims to improve the accuracy of GPS from 5 to 10 metres to as little as 10 centimetres. The advantages for surveying, civil aviation, vehicle guidance and precision agriculture are huge. With it comes the hope of an extra 10 high tech positions at the Tracking Station.

Spare a thought for our hard working bitumen patching crews, continuing to deal with saturated subgrades on our bitumen roads. Council's Engineering staff are currently reviewing if there isn't a better way of carrying out repairs on these roads. Having said that, we count our blessings that we are not one of the shires severely impacted by flooding. One challenge our staff do not need is the mindless vandalism of Uralla's public toilets. It takes time, money and manpower to repair; and staff should be spending their time improving our community. Anyone with information contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Last Thursday the General Manager, Senior Staff and I had the opportunity to have a meeting with Chris Hanger and his team, including staff from the Armidale Office, from the Department of Regional NSW. Chris is the Deputy Secretary for Regional Development and Programs, and Shaun O'Sullivan and Dane O'Connor are both located in Armidale. The Council was well represented at the recent Regional Strategy Forum, from which we understand the outcomes will be made public in M: 0434 244 774 the next week or so. We continue to work closely with the robertbell1055@hotmail.com Department. Chris left Uralla with a very positive view of Robert Bell shire and an increased understanding of the Uralla Shire Resident the

challenges and opportunities that being in a Renewable Energy Zone will throw up.

On the Renewable Energy front, the General Manager, Manager of Planning and I will meet this week with our counterparts at Tamworth Regional Council to ensure all developers are receiving the same advice around Voluntary Planning Agreements, and any Community Benefit Funds. The Thunderbolt Energy Hub Stage 1 is currently preparing responses to the public submissions, including from Uralla Shire Council, and will then forward them back to the NSW Department of Planning for final determination. This may mean that the Independent Planning Commission will need to meet and review the project. Stage 1 currently proposes 32 wind turbines of which only 3 are in Uralla Shire.

Last week I also met with a representative of Clean Energy Australia. No doubt the excellent work being done by ZNet and the proposed developments in the shire have lifted our profile. It is interesting that their 2021 report includes that 32.5% of Australia's total electricity generation in 2021 was down to the renewable energy industry. The report also highlights that the growth has been led by small scale solar, such as that proposed by Meralli Solar near the railway crossing on the Walcha Road.

There was an excellent turnout for the "Friends of McMaugh Gardens" Annual General Meeting. Sue Wilkinson was again elected (unopposed) as President. The hard-working members provide all those extras that, while not on the "essential" list, enhance the residents' lifestyle and comfort. I spoke briefly about Council's ongoing support for, and commitment to, McMaugh Gardens and our preliminary plans to increase the bed numbers to meet demand and

continue to be financially sustainable.

I am looking forward to seeing you all at the Thunderbolt Festival on Saturday October 29. It promises to be the best one yet.

Ambulance Station For Uralla

Local member Adam Marshall was interviewed on ABC Radio North West last week about an ambulance station for Uralla. Mr Marshall said that he recently had spoken to this topic in NSW Parliament, and that he had scheduled a meeting with Brad Hazzard, NSW Health Minister, to discuss the real need for an ambulance station in Uralla.

In the interview, Mr Marshall said that at the moment, the first responders for medical emergencies are medically trained firefighters stationed at Uralla Fire and Rescue Station. While praising the excellent support that has been provided to date by NSW Fire and Rescue staff, this situation is not ideal. Uralla is a growing community, and, considering also that there are many smaller communities with their own ambulance stations, it is only fitting that Uralla has its own ambulance station as well. The 20 km distance to Armidale Hospital means that there could be a dangerous delay before an ambulance can get to the scene of a medical emergency.

The previous mayor of Uralla, Michael Pearce, raised the same issue in an ABC interview in August 2013: "We are the only small town within this region that doesn't have an ambulance station and we have a population of over 6,000 people, so we feel we need, and do require, such a facility."

Uralla Fire and Rescue became the Community First Responder (CFR) unit in 2006. The usual response time for the Uralla CFR is between five and eight minutes and it is usually about 20 minutes after that before an ambulance arrives. In an article in the Sydney Morning Herald of 8 October 2022, it is stated that research shows that first responders have only 10 minutes to have a positive effect on an out-of-hospital heart attack. Typically, a defibrillator device is required in heart attack cases, but, for complex reasons, the NSW Fire and Rescue teams do not have this equipment available. All NSW ambulances are equipped with defibrillators.







Biodiversity Field Event

The stunning bushland on 'Glenburnie' has rarely been accessible by members of the public, but learning the plants, collecting the seed & growing the seed located on the site will be the focus of an event hosted by Southern New England Landcare on Thursday 20th Oct. 2022.

"We are excited to be co-hosting this event with landholder, Dr Ron Hawksford, and ecologist David Carr, of Stringybark Ecological, who will walk with participants through a NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust Agreement area," said Struan Ferguson, SNEL's Project Manager for Biodiversity projects. "This is a rare opportunity to see a stunning local plant community up close, learn about the plants that occur there and collect some seed from plants that are ripe for harvest, We are very fortunate to have ecologist Dave Carr as our guest expert on the day, so that after collecting seed, participants will learn how to propagate the seed in the afternoon session," she said.

This event will enable landholders undertaking private land conservation to develop knowledge and obtain peer support. "Regional landholders with private land conservation agreements have indicated they want to identify the plant communities and learn about the native plants that occur on their land and this event is designed to meet that need," said Struan.

Dr Ron Hawksford will speak on his motivations, experiences, and future hopes for managing several private land conservation areas on his property. "I was overjoyed to learn several new plants that I was not familiar with from Dave Carr during a recent site visit in preparation for the event," said Ron. "I'm looking forward to sharing this area with people, particularly as it is flourishing after all the rain we've had," he said.



5. Recap: The Pleasures Gardens were a fine 'cultural Daryl Albertson visit' in the early times of colonial Sydney. A menagerie of animals, circus acts, musicians and contests entertained all who came. It was here that Nellie met Mr Blanch, first a maid but soon becoming indispensable in his medical practice.

It seemed Nellie had a real knack for healing, whether it was setting a broken bone, stitching a wound, a difficult birth or the breaking of a fever. Her skills often performed while Mr Blanch was passed out in the corner. What she did bring to her healing was the use of her people's traditional bush medicines. The herbs, infusions and teas that had healed her people since memory. Many who she touched, as the agent of Mr Blanch, were eternally grateful and owed their lives to her skills, traditional knowledge and care.

It was also here that Nellie met Molly's father, in time forming a loving union of kindness and mutual respect. He was a tall Kamilaroi man from the west, who came with his people to Gweagal and the Kamay Country to trade. They would both visit the Pleasure Gardens to walk and watch the races. He had said that one day he would be a runner there too, for he was much faster that those people.

The 'Devils Marbles' served their purpose well. A landscape of large rock shelters and caves, both hid men and horses, dry and warm from the torrential rain. Soon enough the sky cleared, sun shined and the storms were blown out to sea. Fred and his men decided likewise, to head off into the wind and part company. The three riders struck out in opposite directions, but Fred decided to stay a while, see what the 'Hills of Gold' might have to offer in the way of opportunity.

The goldfield district around this time was over 2000 souls. This included Happy Valley, Hanging Rock, Bowling Alley Point and Nundle. Nundle township was a Post Office, five hotels, with European and Chinese mining. Isaacson had the general store and Kermode had a smaller one. Webster and Howarth had butcher shops. There were two blacksmiths.

Its was here that William (Will), a buck toothed half-starved runaway boy, turned up on the streets of Nundle. His clothes were in tatters and he fought the local dogs for scraps, in the rubbish thrown to the rear of the street shops. Will had escaped harsh beatings, meted out by his cruel stepfather, a selector. His best pickings were from behind the butcher shops. Frying up the meat and offal discards on a shovel for a fry pan. The butcher Howarth took a shine to him, not for any fatherly concern, but for his possible usefulness in his enterprise(s).

Jonathon Howarth had come to the district to seek his fortune, before the rush, taking up a discrete claim at the Kentucky General Store & Licensed Cafe



New England Solar and the electricity grid

We had a few questions this month from community members who were interested in how the solar farm works with the local electricity grid that supplies homes and businesses with power.

How electricity gets to you

This infographic from Energy Networks Australia, shows how the whole system works together to provide homes with a reliable supply of power.

The solar farm is just like any other large scale generator of electricity. To supply power to homes it first needs to connect to the electricity transmission network.

The transmission network then connects with the local distribution network which eventually finds its way into the suburbs and streets in towns and cities across most of Australia.

When there's a power outage that impacts homes and businesses, on the vast majority of occasions it is caused by a fault on the customer premises, or the local distribution network.

In NSW it is extremely rare for blackouts to be caused by problems on large scale generating units. However, across the country there has recently been more discussion about the need to replace ageing coal fired stations with new forms of generation, like wind or solar backed up with large batteries, to reduce the likelihood of interruptions caused by breakdowns to old generation units.
