Congratulations to Armidale Regional Council on its release of "Toward 50,000". Water security was high on the agenda with Malpas Dam to have its capacity increase and the purchase of Oaky River Dam. A focus on Controlled and Environment Horticulture, Renewable Energy Manufacturing are seen as their drivers for growth. This is based on the solid foundation of agriculture and education. We are acutely aware that the Armidale Airport remains a key for community connectivity, regional resilience, and the aviation industry. The airport is essential in the aerial firefighting base for the New England, including the regional National Parks. One of the starkest figures in the report is the decline in enrolments in the University of New England, from 3,353 full time and 529 part time students in 1991, to 1,683 in 2019.

On Tuesday February 20, ACEN (New England Solar Farm) is having a Community Information Session on the proposed Deeargee Solar Farm. The session is from 10am to 6pm in The Bushranger Motor Inn front room. This proposal for a 320 megawatt development will be subject to the new draft guidelines for renewable energy. These guidelines are for Benefit Sharing and should be \$850 per megawatt per annum for solar energy development. Council will particularly focus on transport and access routes, accommodation, and material such as concrete, gravel and water. Please note that Stage 2 of the New England Solar Farm is already approved. I understand contract negotiations are proceeding with a view to commence constructions in the second half of this year.

Work is still in the early stages for the design of the new transmission lines. Council will have a clearer idea of the timeline when EnergyCo seek a Scoping Report from the Department of Planning. Let's hope that the towers are more robust than the ones we saw destroyed recently in Victoria.

Following a number of enquiries from Council, NBN have now confirmed that they will be on site from March 4 to carry out upgrade work, however outages should not commence before March 7. We have been assured the local NBN team will be in touch with impacted businesses and residents before then, and will conduct some Uralla Shire Council is continuing to pursue funding for our community awareness activities in the region. Once again your Uralla businesses have been targeted by robbers.

Late Wednesday night local institution *Eve Flowers* was burglarised. The front door was smashed in, the small float

taken and another antique door kicked through. Owner Mika Ingvarsdotter says she is "shocked and dismayed at the

loss and damage" but "it could have been worse". This is one of a spate of 'break and enter' robberies in Uralla's Bridge Street with *six* other businesses being burgled in

The damage to property and loss of stock and trading capital has damaged these businesses. These losses are bad but not as bad as the undermining of the feeling of

"I've always felt safe here but the thought of someone violating our community upsets me and makes me reconsider that," Mika said.

Two shops down from *Eve Flowers*, Deb Elliott of *White Ivy* says that she has also experienced an attempted invasion, with the invader breaking a gate lock to get into her property.

"Luckily my husband was awake at 3am and challenged the

intruder who then fled in a small black car".

This is on top of the Mobil Service Station being burgled – with a front window smashed in and cigarettes and cash

stolen on Sunday.

New England Engraving and Gifts' owner Teresa French
has also been robbed *during business hours*. The culprits

were immediately identified, followed and found vandalising

the Bridge Street bridge. Police were contacted several

times by Mrs French but have failed to apprehend the

miscreants even though they have been identified!

That is not to mention the robbery of the *Sweet Place*, the burglary of *Subway* twice in two weeks, the breaking and entering of the *New England Brewery*, and the burglary of

incorrect statements that have been circulating around the Uralla community. I find it very disheartening to see Facebook posts carrying so much misinformation, and an attack on one person, all for what reason.

I was employed by Uralla Shire Council in 1990 to assist in

the opening and operation of McMaugh Gardens Hostel as it was called then. I was the manager from then until I retired in 2008, so I am aware of facts and history of this

facility. See the following misinformation and facts:

1. Misinformation: That Robert Bell put his hand up at a Council meeting to sell McMaugh Gardens. Fact: McMaugh

Gardens facility cannot be sold unless it goes through an arduous process. In 2004 amalgamation of councils in the

region was proposed by the State Government. Uralla

community did not want to be amalgamated. Community

and Council were genuinely concerned that if it did happen McMaughs could be sold off. With the hard work of Tom O'Connor, a section was found in the Local Government Act that assisted us in this situation. McMaugh Gardens was built on Council land which was "Operational Land". Tom

discovered that if Council voted it could be changed to

"Community Land". The legal part of this is that it cannot be sold unless the community of Uralla voted for it. This was signed off by Council in 2005. Robert Bell was a part of all these discussions and process.

2. Misinformation: Robert Bell sat on the Board of Directors for 12 years and watched it go down \$200,00 a year for the entire community. **Fact:** Robert Bell was not on

never a Board of Directors at McMaugh Gardens. A management committee consisting of all community members — no council staff or councillors — assisted with

decisions between the facility and the Council.

the Board of Directors at McMaugh Gardens. There was

Management Committee was there until around 2009/10. No such committee has existed since.

3. Misinformation: Losing \$200,000 a year. **Fact:** If the facility lost \$200,000 a year, for what the author states was for 12 years, the facility would not be there now. McMaugh Gardens is a separate business completely removed from Council financial apprations. McMaugh's financial

Council financial operations. McMaugh's financial management is strictly controlled by State and Federal legislation. Council cannot touch or use this money. They

assist staff of McMaugh Gardens with advice and

documentation. **4. Misinformation:** The author claims that they turned

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things around when they challenged Council to move to higher care. Fact: During the early 2000s aged care was changing; we required more high care beds/rooms. So, in 2001/2002 Council and I proposed we apply for funding for a 10-bed wing to take high care need residents. This was opened in August 2002 by the Hon. Kevin Andrews. The author of these posts was not employed by Council, not as as far as I can remember, and was definitely not on any of the committees involved in these additional rooms' decision.

- 5. Misinformation: Robert Bell was responsible for reducing three road crews to one, reducing staff from 169 to 100, and moving funding money to other projects. Fact: The engineer would not have the total control of these issues; it would have to go all the way through Council and negotiations with the Councillors and unions. I wonder what year this is supposed to have happened.
- 6. The author then goes on with a lot of BS re the water supply. Since the drought there are numerous studies being done to improve our water situation, which is ongoing with many different groups.

I worked with Robert Bell from 1990 – 2008. Since then, I have worked with him on community issues and projects. He is a man committed to this town and the citizens.

Australia's First World Sports Champion



On Christmas Day 2023, the Sydney Morning Herald had a feature about stand-out sporting events in Australia's past. Fairfax sports writer Peter FitzSimons chose as his favourite event the sculling world championship of 27 June 1876, when Edward (Ned) Trickett of Sydney defeated Englishman James H. Sadler on the Thames on the Putney-Mortlake course in 24 mins. 36 secs. and became the first Australian to win a world championship in any sport.

Peter relates the very enthusiastic reception Ned Trickett received when he arrived back in Sydney four months later: a crowd of 25,000 was there to greet him, and his carriage was pulled by spectators up Pitt Street. There were celebrations late into the night; Ned was presented with £900 to thank him for the honour he had bestowed on the colony. He was our first sporting superstar.

But what Peter did not mention in his article was that McCrossin's Mill Museum here in Uralla has, to the best of our knowledge, the most extensive collection of Ned Trickett memorabilia in the world, proudly displayed on the first floor. But why Uralla? That is a sad story: Ned's son Frederick

lived in Uralla and operated Trickett's General Store here. In 1916, while helping his son, Ned was injured working in a gold mine when the walls of the mine shaft collapsed. He died a few days later from his injuries, aged 65, and was buried in the Salvation Army section of Uralla cemetery. A marble obelisk memorial to him was funded by public subscription and erected on his grave at Uralla in 1918.

It bears the following inscription: "In memory of Edward Trickett, champion sculler of the world from 1876 to 1880. Woolwich Dock, N.S.W., 1851. Died Uralla November 28, 1916. A man justly honored by all who knew him, as a noble type of sportsman, and an equally noble type of citizen, and the first Australian to win a world's championship. Erected by his friends and admirers."

This memorial was vandalised in 1982 by persons unknown, but rescued with the Trickett family's



approval and restored, to form, together with Trickett's 1876 World Champion's trophy, the nucleus of the 'Trickett Triumph' exhibition at McCrossin's Mill Museum, where it can be viewed 7 days a week between 10am and 4pm. replacement headstone was erected on Ned's grave.

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Book Club - Reviews

The Book Club met after a brief sojourn and two books were read and discussed in our February meeting.

Quaint Deeds: Unlikely Adventures in Teaching and Treasure-Hunting: A Memoir by AJ Mackinnon. Published 2023

.....This memoir is indeed unlikely! It follows the author as he

recalls vignettes of his time as teacher in England's Ellesmere College in Shropshire, a public boarding school for boys in the 1980s and 1990s. The public school system in the UK is the equivalent of our private school system. The book recalls his time as teacher with tales of student exploits

book recalls his time as teacher with tales of student e and his own adventures whilst teaching English.

The memoir aims at a whimsical reminisce but reads as a tedious Boys Own Annual from the late Victorian era. It's a jolly romp full of privileged English boys playing pranks and being mischievous and cheeky, and a reminder that coming of age in the 1980s as described by the author was probably not much different than it was in the 1890s.

battles and self-representation they find the bailiff at their door, repossessing their beloved Welsh farm and with it their only source of income. The triple catastrophe was finding out that Moth had a rare and incurable degenerative brain disease.

The couple chose not to burden family and friends, their two children were just managing to support themselves through university. They find themselves with scant savings, no credit rating and homeless. While already reeling from the cumulative stress of the last three years which took their savings and then their home, Moth's diagnosis sent their world into turmoil and desperation. The last of their money

Enter the South West Coast Path, a 630 mile rugged coast walk that takes in Somerset, Devon, Cornwall and Dorset via Lands End. With no options they could endure, Ray and

Moth join the path at Minehead and begin a redemptive

journey that neither would foresee at the start.

they used to buy backpacks, tent, and a sleeping bag each.

They couldn't afford campsites, so wild-camped, which is illegal in England and Wales. With a meagre dribble of welfare, the couple subsist on noodles, fudge, and tins of tuna. Often hungry, finding places to pitch their tent late in the afternoon to try and remain undetected, they endured extreme conditions on the cliff-tops with the odd foray into towns to purchase supplies.

The memoir chronicles the walkers they meet on the path, some generous and empathic, others harsh and uncharitable to their homeless state. They washed in the ocean, rinsed their clothes in the same place and endured sunburn, hunger, the constant need to find fresh water, and the challenges of toileting all fresco.

Ray writes with simplicity and emotion the day-to-day, hand-to-mouth existence. Lots of dark days, told with a tinge of humour to soften, serve as a stark reminder of the fragility of our existence. As they walk, they heal their wounds, both literally and figuratively, Moth's condition improves with the hard physical strain, his symptoms are reduced, and he abandons his medication.

The book is part travelogue, part memoir, part pilgrimage, a powerful story of resilience, hope and love with an appreciation of the coastal ecologies and the cycles of nature. It's a testament to living in the moment and a visceral connection to the land.

Ray has gone on to write two more novels, both about their

struggle to return to village life and the call of more treks. Our next book club will be on Saturday 9th March at 8.30am at *The Alternate Root*. The book is *Mullumbimby* by Melissa Lucashenko . All welcome.




