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Growing RFS Unease Over Upcoming Bush Fire Season



Recent Get Ready Weekend events have been conducted across the Shire and the state generally. This event was conducted by the Diggings' Brigade at the Invergowrie Store.

The threat of a severe summer for bush fires is developing into a major concern for the NSW RFS. NSW Chief Superintendent Heath Simpson, talking on ABC Local Radio recently, highlighted the need for people living in the bush to make their emergency plans now and prepare their properties for the worst.

He stressed the upcoming season is looking particularly dangerous for several reasons. The major concern is that after two years of La Niña followed by a dry winter, a large

amount of long dry grass is present on rural properties. Previously burnt bushland in the last drought has almost fully regenerated and previously unburnt areas are dry and vulnerable to fire outbreaks. These fears are shared by local RFS members. Chris Petrov, Diggings' Senior Deputy Captain, has pointed out that already this year local brigades have broken all previous incident attendance records – and the fire season has just begun. Making the situation more concerning are RFS surveys revealing many people in bush fire areas have not yet prepared their emergency plan. Even more alarming is the revelation that more people have decided to stay with their property rather than leave, even when told to by the authorities.

To address this developing situation, our local bush fire brigades have conducted Get Ready Weekend community events around the Shire to talk to rural residents about developing their emergency plans. Such events have been held across NSW.

Heath Simpson suggested an emergency plan might best start with a family discussion to decide what is to happen if the property comes under threat. If leaving early for example, at what stage will you leave? (perhaps when a fire is within 5km in severe fire danger conditions.) Where will you go? What will you take? All the information needed to make a fire emergency plan is on the RFS website: www.rfs.nsw.gov.au

December 2021, after serving five years as a Councillor. He was previously Director of Engineering for Uralla Shire Council, lives in town, and has a grazing block at Kentucky. Cr Bell gives a personal view of some of the more important matters concerning Council and ratepayers in recent weeks.

Congratulations to ZNet, SNELC (Southern New England Landcare) and Stringybark Ecological on putting together an excellent workshop on reducing the sediment flow into Kentucky Creek Dam. The prediction is that between 200 to 800 tonnes per annum is ending up in the town water supply dam. Council has arranged for testing to occur later this year to actually identify how much the dam's 500ML storage has been reduced. Please note there is no appetite to desilt the dam due to the cost, the problem of what you do with the silt and the impact on any species that have made the silt their home. There was interesting discussion on how best to manage the catchment. The positive message is that the catchment grass cover averages well over 80% which is the best way to cut erosion and keep rain in the soil profile. One presentation was given on the work done by Armidale Regional Council and the landowners in the Malpas Dam catchment.

Council has endorsed a Draft Renewable Energy Community Benefit Policy to be placed on public exhibition. This policy is proposed to apply to state significant and regionally significant renewable energy projects. It is essential that we look to deliver a long term dividend for the community. Please note that this policy does not include how these funds will be managed or what projects will be prioritised by the Council. Both these issues will involve extensive public consultation.

The next Councillor Community session will be held at Barry Munday Reserve on Sunday October 8 from 2-4pm. This will also give residents in the area an opportunity to discuss the proposed subdivision north of the reserve. Please note this development has not yet been considered by Council. While the first two sessions at Invergowrie and Rocky River have seen small numbers, they have still been very valuable in discussing all issues in the respective areas.

While the 2022/23 Draft Financial Statements make mostly positive reading, Council continues to focus on the unrestricted cash position. The grants under the Drought, Covid and Flood Recovery Programs have significantly boosted our income, and as a result, expenditure over the ast twelve months. I do not expect the level of state government grants to continue. The special flood funding for road repairs has been a tremendous benefit. The Financial Statement will now be sent to external auditors. Once the audit is completed, it will be presented to Council along with the Auditor's Report to a public meeting. It is worth noting that our Electricity bill has increased by 60% from \$159,000 to \$255,000. It seems ironic, as we are part of the Renewable Energy Zone and already produce more power

The Federal Government's "Review of Community Engagement Practices" by the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner failed at the most recent hurdle by not meeting with the five New England mayors during his recent visit to the area. Following a number of telephone conversations, the Commissioner, Mr Andrew Dyer, has agreed to a Zoom meeting on Thursday. Not quite the same as meeting us in the region! Council has made a detailed submission to the review, including highlighting that the consultation has been mostly poor. The community needs clear information on what the long term benefits will be. The following statement is included in Council's submission: "A sustainable future for host communities where the benefit of renewable energy can be showcased should be part of long term engagement and planning for renewable energy." Council is looking for not only contributions from developers, but also through partnerships between local, state and Federal government. A full copy of our submission is available for any interested party to view. My thanks go to my fellow Councillors and staff who helped prepare this submission in a short period of time.

Councillors and staff have also been working hard to prepare an application for Regional Housing Strategic Planning Fund – Round 2, to allow Council to prepare a "Uralla Local Housing Strategy." This would be a 10-20 year long term vision review. Council has already

been engaging with key stakeholders and I am confident of success. Stay tuned.

Parks and Facility Upgrades for the Uralla Community

Council is pleased to be able to provide this update to our residents regarding exciting news about new and upgraded community and recreation facilities.

Council received NSW State and Commonwealth Government Funding to deliver four community projects for the benefit of our residents and visitors. The NSW State and Commonwealth projects funding arrangement means that these facility upgrades are delivered at no cost to ratepayers.

Rotary Park Upgrade

The Rotary Park Upgrade Project has reached Practical Completion and is now open to the public. The community is encouraged to drop by and have a look at the new facility. It will serve as a wonderful rest stop for travellers driving north and south. Council is currently looking for solutions to accommodate multiple RV and caravan access.

Council would like to extend special thanks to the community members involved with the Community Garden, which is located in very close proximity to the new park. The Rotary Park Project has had a significant impact on the gardens and its operation. Council is grateful for the ongoing engagement with the Community Garden Group to ensure that this invaluable service continues. Council recognises and appreciates the great work done by the Community Garden Group.

Pioneer Park Upgrade

Uralla residents and visitors would have noticed that work has commenced at Pioneer Park. The landmark project will deliver a Fibonacci themed walkway with seating, including an entry statement. Captured in the design concept illustration below, it will showcase the unique Uralla postcode 2358, the only postcode in Australia that captures part of the Fibonacci sequence. An exciting component of the project is the proposed inclusion of stenciled artwork, using the conceptual designs by our local school children as part of the pathway feature.

The park will be replanted using tree, shrub and grass species identified in the Council Tree Policy.

The Glen Precinct Upgrade

This project has two major components:

1. The completion of the *Constellations of the South* Sculptures; and

2. Infrastructure for visitors, including parking and pedestrian facilities

This park will continue to be an off leash dog walking area.

Constellations of the South Council has approved several further artwork designs to be commissioned into sculptures for installation at The Glen. The completion of this project will be the culmination of a 20 year vision.

The project will also deliver a new asphalt entrance road leading to a new asphalt car park with designated parking

bays. Two culvert creek crossings will enhance accessibility – one for a connecting pathway to Rotary Park. A new wheelchair friendly BBQ and park furniture will be installed and the information shelter upgraded.

Additionally, Council resolved (subject to funding) to develop a Stage 2 plan which will incorporate elements of the design which reflect the contemporary Aboriginal perspective on astronomy.

Elements identified in Stage 1 which were not delivered will be revisited.

Courthouse Upgrade

Council received funding for restoration and adaptive reuse of the Uralla Courthouse. Works completed so far include repairs and reinstatement of the verandah, new roof and repairs and painting throughout. Yet to be finalised are the relocation of a kitchenette, repair and rejuvenation of the original flooring, reinstating the original picket fence, reuse of heritage panels as wainscoting, adding disability accessible toilet facilities, refurbishment of the existing toilets and an LED light upgrade incorporating premise rewiring.

Council has resolved to obtain heritage advice from the appointed heritage advisor regarding the completion of the Courthouse Project. The goal is to have the Uralla Courthouse repurposed and available to the public as a multi-functional centre.

Oops! Residents of Dumaresq Road, Mundays Lane and Marble Hill Road in Saumarez Ponds were given only ten days, instead of the requisite 14 days, to respond to da-57-2023-lot-4-mundays-lane-saumarez-ponds-proposed-

subdivision and PLAN SHOWING PROPOSED SUBDIVISION OF LOT 4 IN DP590685 - PROPOSED LAYOUT 828 Bundarra Road, SAUMAREZ PONDS NSW 2350. Fourteen days is the time required.

This proposal fails to account for potential environmental impact on the Saumarez Ponds/Ferris Lane Lagoon ecosystem. A list of birds sighted at the Ferris Lane Lagoon is found at https://ebird.org/hotspot/L18035429. Frogs identified at 89 Munday's Lane or 828 Bundarra Road, can be found at the Frog id records, Explore FrogID records | Australian Museum FrogID Project. To explore the vegetation growth and water levels in the lagoon, go to the Dynamic Lagoons Earthengine site at https://jamesbrinkhoff.users.earthengine.app/view/dynamicla goons. This page defaults to Dangars Lagoon. From the

dropdown box, select 'Saumarez Ponds' to move to the area under discussion. The graphed data can be enlarged by selecting the arrow within a box icon to the upper right of the box. Data from 1988 for this lagoon is found in Figure 5 (graph c) of the 'Ecosphere paper describing methods' also linked in the text box on this webpage.

The single access road to 19 blocks puts future residents at risk of fires moving with the prevailing winds from SW to NE across that road, blocking the escape route. While the original approval for subdivision was made some years ago, significant climatic changes have occurred since then, raising questions about the appropriateness of twohectare blocks approval for the whole block at 828 Bundarra Road.

Taking a significant parcel of agricultural grazing land out of production, the planning priorities of Uralla Shire Council: productivity, liveability, sustainability and infrastructure, are not supported by this DA as it has been presented to neighbours of the proposed development. **Sincerely**,


Wollun Church Centenary Celebration

cleaning gutters, checking that garden hoses can reach all parts of the yard, keeping grass short and removing combustible materials away from buildings. Farm owners should consider establishing fire breaks. Diggings' Brigade President, Bob Crouch, strongly recommends not to rely on electric water pumps powered from the grid in bush fires as they are prone to power blackouts just when they are most needed. Use petrol pumps or generators instead. Talk to your local RFS people if you would like a fire assessment of your property. Fire hazard reduction burns may also be possible during the off-season.

Property owners might consider making up an emergency storage box. In this, you place anything you will need to defend or evacuate your home: change of clothes and shoes for family members, important personal papers, torches, water bottles, first aid kit, battery radio with radio frequencies recorded, passports etc. On the lid, record items that need to be packed at the last moment such as medications, prescriptions, and even perhaps food for pets etc.

Protecting yourself from bush fires is one thing, but preventing them in the first place would be far better. Some issues coming to light in our area include:

• the dumping of hot wood ash on or near dry grass or in wheelie bins. Best to dispose into a metal bucket away from combustible material.

• the use of slashers and the outdoor use of angle grinders and welding equipment without suitable quantities of water or an extinguisher at hand.

• the many properties in Uralla Shire, such as Invergowrie, that are accessed via dead end roads. For people living in such places, decisions about evacuating obviously need to be made early.

Underneath the yellow daisy grew a white yam potato. Dug from the ground it was roasted in the hot coals and was one of 'The Gals' favourite treats. The leaves were also eaten and a little bitter. Across the tablelands this yam had been the staple for Aboriginal people. Now wherever sheep or cattle ranged, the sweet Murwong daisy was no more. Thankfully their Mountain Black had nary seen the white man's herds up until this time.

The Murnong was so prized that Nell kept a garden of daisy, a small plot near where the water was caught from the hut. She weeded and hilled the soft earth, planting little Murwong plants on top. Each plant was well cared, and a rough pole yard surrounded the plot in an attempt to keep the wallabies out. But wallabies were always keen to get at their Murnong and most mornings Molly chased wallabies off the mountain. It was by far one of her favourite jobs, in turn after each one, weaving, bobbing, zigging and zagging. The chase over when she had tagged her quarry before it dived off the mountain top and down its steep side. Nellie would watch her girl from the hut thinking, 'She's just like her father, runs like the wind blows'.

As Ma led the chestnut down the track to the Thompson Farm, Molly fed him daisies. When the homestead came into sight, they could see Bill and The Lady catching their multicoloured chickens, off the laundry roof. They were shoving them back into their laying coop. Once the chestnut was hitched to the house rail, they helped catch the last couple of the stubborn brightly coloured birds. Bill hadn't fixed the coop properly since the big flood had threatened to carry their hens downstream. He had let them out so they could seek refuge on the house roof but now preferred to roost on the laundry roof instead of laying in their coop below.

Bill recognised the big chestnut immediately and asked. 'What yu doing with Fred's chestnut then?'. Molly piped up, 'Fred left it and said you would know what to do. And he's not stolen!'. Nellie added 'Fred said he won it at the Tenterfield races and you's is owed it for helping us with food and what not'. Bill nodded, 'Yes, I knows what to do with him. Free cuppas sparked conversations on mental health in Michael's Café on Thursday, September 14.

Local non-profit HealthWISE donated more than \$6500 to 29 cafes throughout the New England North West and southern Queensland to shout the morning rush for the national initiative *R U OK? Day*.

Owner of Michael's Café, Michael Welbourn, said *R U OK? Day* reminds people of the importance of reaching out to friends and neighbours. Customers were also offered *R U OK? Day* resources on starting conversations about mental health.

"With mental health a big issue in the community, I am proud to help in any way to get the message across," Michael said.

HealthWISE Mental Health team leader Tanya Hague recognised that it can be daunting to ask a loved one if they're ok, especially if the answer is no. She said you don't need to be a health professional to help someone who's struggling, and it can be as simple as lending an ear.

"You can absolutely save someone's life just by listening. Just being there with them, showing them that you care, maybe offering to sit down and have a cup of tea with them," she said.

"It is really important to genuinely listen to the person and give them your full attention. Be prepared, because it may be a long conversation," she said.

Tanya recommended visiting the *R U OK? Day* website to learn more about how to respond when someone tells you they are not ok. HealthWISE also runs free Touchpoints workshops, which educate community members on recognising and responding to people at risk of suicide.

Community Solar Farm

Community-owned renewable energy projects are a great way for local people to really be involved with and benefiting from renewable energy. Several communities have been working towards establishing their own solar farms, with batteries also becoming a desirable addition to balance their power supply. However, it takes years of work by those communities to turn such a dream into reality.

Uralla is being offered a generous opportunity.

Meralli Solar has a 4.41MW solar farm with an 11MWh battery all approved and ready to start building in the new year. This will supply enough power for 2000 homes and help to stabilise local energy supply. Due to their use of the innovative PEG system for construction, which uses 72% less emissions than standard systems, the project will be completed by this time next year. Meralli has always been interested in supporting regional energy security and where better to make an offer of co-ownership to a community than in the town where they are based, Uralla.


Consequently, they have asked Community Power Agency and ZNET Uralla to work with the community to explore their interest in becoming part of a community ownership group for the solar farm. This would enable local people to be co-owners and investors in the solar farm and get a return on their investment and a stake in decision-making.

The farm is located approx. 2 kms out of town between Racecourse Rd and Thunderbolt's Way, on the site of the 'old pole plant'. No new transmission lines are required, and the power will be delivered straight to the Uralla sub-station. We are keen to canvass interest and comments widely in the community.


