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Rural Health Petition Passes 8,000 Signature Mark

Almost a month since the launch of the electorate-wide community petition calling on the NSW Parliament to split the Hunter New England Health District, directly employ doctors in rural hospitals and dramatically increase nursing numbers — more than 8,000 signatures have been collected, with hundreds more being received every day. Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said the response to the petition had been overwhelming and is calling on the community to keep up momentum so the required 10,000 signature threshold is reached. "Since community leaders and I launched this petition, the response from communities large and small across our region has been mind-blowing and I'm confident that we can maintain that momentum to reach the goal of 10,000 signatures and go well beyond that," Mr Marshall said.

"Every signature is hugely important and it has been amazing how businesses, community groups, councils and individuals have taken on the challenge to get the petition to as many people as possible. The 10,000 signatures are need to trigger a debate on the floor of State Parliament and force immediate action."

The MP said that since the launch of the petition, he had heard directly from scores of residents keen to share their own experiences of disappointment and frustration when seeking treatment at our local hospitals. "The groundswell of dissent clearly demonstrates to the government that this is a burning issue for many in our region and that we won't rest until we are heard and changes made."

"If you have not yet signed the petition yet, get out there and get it done people-power can win the day – sign this

petition and show your support for this push, to save our rural health system and back our hard-working local health staff.

"The petition will be available in all local council administration centres and local businesses in every town across the region. It can also be signed in the MP's office at Moree and Armidale. Copies of the petition can also be posted or emailed, and you can request that by calling the Electorate office on 6772 5552.

People have until 30 September to sign the petition, before Mr Marshall tables it in State Parliament.

Keeping Uralla Cool

In response to the trend of increasing summer temperatures, a project is being launched to work with the local community in developing a plan for "Keeping Uralla Cool". The project is a collaboration between the Landscape Foundation of Australia (LFA) and ZNET Uralla and is funded by the NAB Foundation Community Grant Program. The project is led by Linda Corkery, Director of LFA and Emeritus Professor UNSW, and Dr. Louise McKenzie, landscape architect with expertise on urban heat in public spaces. Linda and Louise are working closely with the community through ZNET Uralla and President Carol Shantal.

Over the next six months, three public workshops will be held in Uralla to expand participants' understanding of the impacts of increasing temperatures and extreme heat events on human health and the local environment. We will explore ways to adapt and manage our homes and individual landscapes, particularly in relation to the increased energy consumption associated with operating air conditioners. Additionally, we will look at ideas for the design and management of public spaces, streetscapes, open spaces, and consider how the general environment can mitigate the impacts associated with higher temperatures.

There are many individual and collective actions that can make up a cooling strategy. For example, increasing the amount of tree canopy throughout the town; creating cool public spaces and streetscapes with plantings, water, shade, cool paving materials; installing shade structures and 'cool hubs' in key locations that can provide refuge during extreme heats. It is equally important to plan for the social dimensions of managing heat events, such as issuing 'heat alerts' and keeping in contact with vulnerable citizens—children, people with disabilities and elderly people. When extreme heat events occur, these are people who may need assistance to move to a cool hub.

While the town of Uralla will be the focus for this project, many of the actions described above will be equally effective in other villages across the Shire and beyond. The Project team will engage with Uralla Shire Council to

seek their support for the proposed actions coming out of the workshops, particularly those involving public facilities, open spaces, streets and roadways.

Anyone living or working in the Uralla local government area interested to learn more about these issues and the actions that can be taken to prepare for hotter weather is welcome to join in the free public workshops for this project. The first workshop will be held on Sunday, 18 September at the Uralla Community Centre, 9 Hill Road from 12.30-4pm. Bush Fire Danger Period

On the first of September, 27 Local Government Areas (including Uralla Shire) commenced their bush fire danger period. Residents and land holders should make sure they know the rules when it comes to the use of fire. Along with required fire permits, you must also notify your local fire authority and neighbours of your intent to burn 24 hours in advance. The first of September marks the start of the new Australian Fire Danger Ratings System. Know the risk for your area & what you'll do if a fire threatens. Key changes:

- A true national system used in all states and territories, meaning you'll see the same ratings being used wherever you live, work or travel.
- A more accurate system, using eight different vegetation types to inform fire danger ratings.
- Fire danger ratings will be simplified from six levels to four, and each level will give clear actions to take to stay safe during the fire season.
- Four-day ratings will be used, to give the community better information to help plan activities.
- New fire danger rating signs across NSW, showing the new ratings and action statements.



After two weeks the hut began to leak terribly, for the bark sheets that covered the roof were heavy with water and began to sag. Letting a fall of water onto the huts dirt floor below. The floor then began to fill, next the hut was like an indoor waterhole. Ma dug a long trench through to the back of the hut, water flowed out like a river, but it saved them both from drowning.

The coach track north was too wet for the service, nor horse could pass. Their mountainside wept from every slope, dumping into the stream, which had turned into a swirling and twirling wave, as it made its way downstream. Ma was fearful for the Thompson Farm, saying that they might get swept away, when she saw the cascading wave of water.

The sun then began to shine for what felt like the longest time, and the pair cautiously left the hut to investigate the damage outside. The surrounding tall timber had been through the wars, branches hung and fallen branches scattered the ground. A few trees had been uprooted and were lying like giant dead soldiers on the battlefield. Ma said 'I suppose we'll not have to go too far for wood anytime soon'. Molly agreed and they both got to work airing and drying out their belongings and draining the water from the huts floor. They had to cut long timber braces, to support the sagging bark roof from the inside, while they refixed the roof. Ma said with a giggle, 'maybe we should just leave these poles here, just in case it rains again'. Molly giggled too.

After a few days of warm sunshine, Nell and Molly finally got down the valley to the Thompson Farm. Getting down off the mountain was sometimes difficult, still slippery in patches and large washouts in the track to jump. On the way down they found the Thompson cow and calf on the lower track, feeding on green pick that had sprung up after the rain. Nellie spoke gently to the cow, catching and tying her belt around its neck. While Ma led the cow, Molly coaxed the calf and they all continued down the mountain track to the farm.

Today, I still carry a hollow area on my shin.


There's barely any flesh below the skin.
