Armidale Regional LGA In 7-Day Lockdown

The following press release by Adam Marshall is very relevant to all Uralla residents - Ed.

It's the news we all hoped never to hear, but it's happened, we officially now have two active COVID-19 cases in Armidale.

The cases are directly linked to the Newcastle case cluster with a young person returning to Armidale from Newcastle and infecting another person in their household. Both cases are in isolation.

As a result, communities within the entire Armidale Regional Local Government Area will enter a seven-day lockdown from 5pm Saturday 7 August until 12.01am Sunday, 15 August, in order to stop the virus spreading any further.

Like the Orange community before us recently, if we stick together and do this right – following the stay-at-home orders – we'll get through this in the next seven days.

It's just another challenge we must, and will, overcome.

Everyone should stay at home, unless they absolutely need to leave for one of the prescribed reasons, such as shopping for essentials, medical appointments, getting a COVID test or a COVID vaccine or for essential work.

You **cannot have visitors** to your home, including family and friends.

Schools within the Armidale Regional LGA will also be closed next week. More details about this will be provided to parents as soon as possible.

The stay-at-home orders, are the same as those which apply in Greater Sydney. They can be found here:

These rules apply to anyone residing within the Armidale Regional LGA and **anyone who has been there on or after 31 July 2021.**

Local COVID testing clinic hours have also been extended:

- Armidale Hospital testing clinic will operate from 9am to 5pm, seven days. Appointments are can be made by phoning 0427 923 080.
- Lavery Pathology drive-through clinic at Armidale Airport will operate from 8am to 2.30pm this weekend. Appointments are NOT required.

Anyone with even the mildest of symptoms, such as a runny nose or scratchy throat, must come forward for testing and self-isolate until they get their result.

This is now as serious as it gets for us. We do not want to see those two cases grow, so the message is clear: **Stay at home, follow the rules and together we'll get this done!**

I'll provide another update to the community this afternoon with some more detailed information about the next seven days and other measures.

Robert Bell was elected to Uralla Shire Council in September 2016 and has served one term as Deputy Mayor. He was previously Director of Engineering for Uralla Shire, lives in town, and has a grazing block at Kentucky. In his regular column, Cr Bell gives a personal view of some of the more important matters concerning Council and ratepayers in recent weeks.

Now that the NSW Local Government elections are set back until December 4, it will give those thinking of running more time to make themselves known to the electorate. It is a little frustrating that even the December date is not set in concrete. At least two additional residents are now considering running.

Clr O'Connor's efforts to have the Fees and Charges for 2021/22 considered as an urgent item at the last Council meeting was defeated 5 votes to 4. Tom's motion to remove the charge for green waste, reduce the Aquatic Centre charges and reduce the Construction Certificate charges will now be on the Council business paper agenda for the August meeting. All increases above the CPI should include a full report justifying them.

More frustration with the Uralla Waste Facility once again having leachate water carted from the onsite dam to be discharged into our sewer system on the corner of Rowan Avenue and the highway. While we do not want another fine, the option of an additional dam constructed in the south eastern corner would be a much cheaper and a longer term solution.

With the imminent closure of the NAB Uralla branch, and confirmation from the property owner that NAB are terminating their lease, Council has now resolved to proceed to tender for our banking services. We have a local preference purchasing policy that will be considered in this tender.

The draft Media Policy has been placed on public display with important changes to Item 4 and 6.2. My concerns were outlined in my last article in Wordsworth. There remain those in the community who question the need for this policy at all. These residents can email Council with their concerns. All submissions will be considered before the policy can be adopted.

Bundarra residents are feeling frustrated with the latest advice showing a May 2022 completion for the Bundarra Sewer Scheme. This date continues to move in the wrong direction.

Linda and I are looking forward to attending the Uralla Shire Business Chamber Awards next Friday night. It is a wonderful opportunity to celebrate Uralla Shire businesses and community organisations in what has been another difficult year. The biggest frustration seems to be the uncertainty. We do need to also celebrate (touch wood) that we have not had to endure a lockdown. New regions seem to be added to the lock down list on a daily basis. The reduction in travelling public is having a profound impact on our business community.

The Visitor Information Centre now has a new stove/oven and a microwave. I have asked one of our Aniwani Elders to check the current status of the Aniwani Cultural Collection.

A special thank you goes to Gwen Fuller for providing me with details of the naming of Fuller Park after her father-in-law, Mr Arthur Fuller. Mr Fuller worked all his adult life on the Council. Arthur's chief interest was horticulture, and he specialised in propagating and growing dahlias which were planted all around Uralla. The opening ceremony for Fuller Park was in February 1967 and was performed by the then Shire President, Clr R Croft (Richard Croft's father).

For the last twelve months, we have had our spirits lifted by seeing magnificent photos on Facebook posted by Michael Hull, Jenny Brown and Jaz Taylor. Jaz has an exhibition at the Uralla Library during August. I would recommend you go and see it.

Dear Editor,

Having recently observed the NSW health system (read NSW Government) in action, I can now fully understand why that same health system (NSW Government) has lost control of this latest outbreak of the Covid Delta strain.

I took a person aged in their 70s to the Armidale hospital emergency department, with a non life threatening ailment, arriving at 1pm. After they had seen Triage and the registrar, I left this person, drip now in place, seated in the emergency waiting room, at 5pm. On returning at 8pm, still in the same seat, drip still in place, I was informed by this person they would be remaining overnight.

I returned at 11.30am next day to find the patient, indeed in bed, drip still attached, but **still fully clothed in the street clothes** they had arrived in nearly 24 hours beforehand! If the hospital can't supply a gown for an inpatient, let alone anything for their morning wash, have they actually got any PPE, at least for their own staff in an emergency?

I was also unlucky to still be there at lunchtime! An unappetising meal was delivered, everything, including one slice of bread, in plastic. The plastic waste the hospital must generate in any 24 hour period must be horrendous. It makes our State Government's legislation to force supermarkets to reduce their use of plastic seem hollow indeed

Some other observations made during my visits. A lady in her 80s, arriving at emergency at approx 4pm, was still sitting quietly in the same position at 11pm. She had been spoken to during this time and I witnessed her blood pressure being taken. The registrar who came to take her blood pressure had to first get a towel to mop up water from the floor of the waiting area that had lain there for a few hours. Lastly the rubbish bin in the emergency waiting area was, by 8pm, well and truly overflowing.

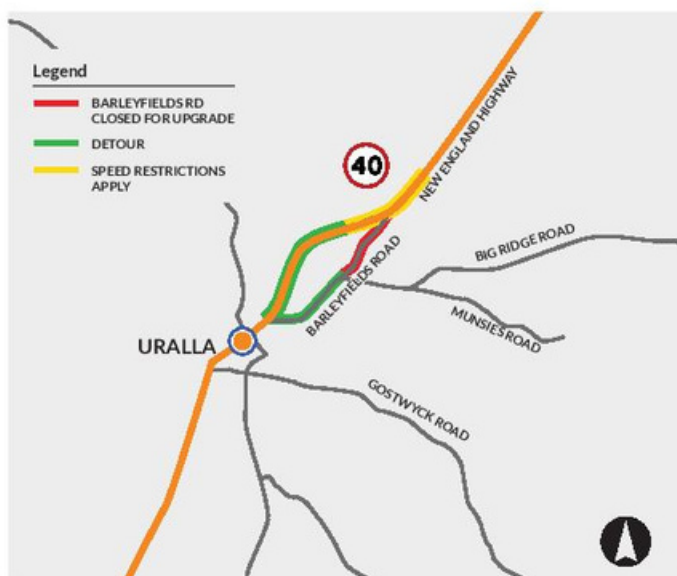
Speed reductions on New England Highway near Barleyfields Rd

New England Highway works

The road upgrade works to the New England Highway at the intersection with Barleyfields Road have now begun and are expected to be completed by early September.

The works include road widening and a new right hand turn bay to allow safe access into Barleyfields Rd for construction and maintenance traffic accessing the New England Solar Farm site.

To help us complete this work safely, 40 km speed restrictions will be in place on a small section of the New England Highway.



Great response to Uralla Grants

We do understand that these works will cause a slight delay to motorists' travel time and so we would like to thank you for your patience.

We will be working as quickly and safely as possible to complete the work.

The Kentucky Memorial Hall and Literary Institute

The hall at Kentucky is a memorial to the service men and women from the Kentucky district who served in war. Since its opening in 1941 the basic hall has undergone many changes. In the days when wedding receptions were held in the main hall with food laid out on trestle tables with wooden chairs and benches and the toilets a trudge down the back paddock, any improvements were done with voluntary community work.

In recent years grants have been accessed enabling work to be carried out which no number of street stalls and raffles could have financed. Both Federal and State grants have provided us with a new kitchen and inside toilets, repaired the buttresses and wooden windows, re surfaced our wonderful floor, painted the inside and out and installed solar panels.

Most recently a State "Stronger Communities Fund" grant has seen the old roof replaced as well two new tanks installed supplying the hall and giving the local RFS quick access to emergency water. The back section has been closed in from floor to ground level preventing frost damage to pumps and plumbing. The Kentucky community is proud of their hall with its historic photos of the early settlement days and the district's servicemen and women. When Covid requirements allow, the hall will invite the local and wider community to enjoy a morning tea and inspect the improvements.

A Name Change for Armidale Street

The village of Uralla in 1854 had several streets running east to west which were King, Hill and Salisbury Streets and passing through from north to south were The Great Northern Road (Queen Street), Armidale and Maitland Streets. This gave the intersection of Hill and Queen Street the town centre. Uralla's main street would later be relocated to Armidale Street.

It was decided by the Town Council in 1919 that it would be appropriate for the name of Armidale Street to be changed to something more suitable. It was thought that the name was inappropriate and misleading, as some mail was apparently being sent on to Armidale. And so, the motion that the name of Armidale Street be changed was put and carried. It was then decided that a competition be arranged for the naming of the street with prize money of £1/1 being offered.

A ballot was taken at the Council Chambers on the 22.11.1919 for the purpose of electing a new name for Armidale Street. Of the 50 or so names submitted by the rate-payers 10 were selected:- Main Avenue, Pine Street, High Street, Bridge Street, Northern Street, Pine Avenue, McCrossin Street, Third Avenue, McCrossin Avenue and Main Street.

The following suggested the name of Bridge Street:- Miss I. Burton, Audley Cooper, T. Ward snr, T. Edwards, W. G. Nixon, M. Mackay and J. L. Eather. There were 16 votes recorded for the name. Miss I. Burton was selected to be awarded the prize money; she named it after Bridge Street in Sydney, where the wool was sent.

On the 24.11.1919 notice was given that the name of Armidale Street had been changed to Bridge Street, by resolution of Council.

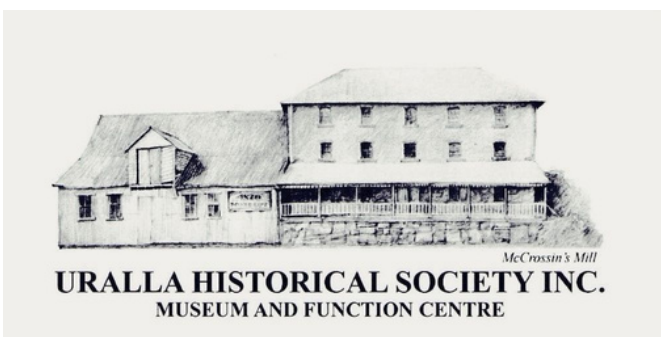

Six areas begin Bush Fire Danger Period early in NSW

27 July 2021

The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) today announced six Local Government Areas (LGAs) in the New England and Northern Tablelands areas will commence the Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) early, due to prevailing local conditions.

NSW RFS Superintendent Chris Wallbridge said the six LGAs that will enter the BFDP on 1 August 2021 are Armidale Regional, Walcha, Uralla, Glen Innes Severn, Inverell and Tenterfield.

"During the Bush Fire Danger Period, landowners and managers are required to obtain a Fire Permit from their local Fire Control Centre before lighting any fires, including hazard reduction burns," Supt Wallbridge said.

"I strongly urge people to exercise extreme caution when carrying out these activities as we have all seen the devastation that bush fires can inflict on a community.

"Never leave a fire unattended and if a fire does escape, it is essential to call Triple Zero (000) immediately so that emergency services can respond and minimise the damage."

Fire Permit holders are required to let fire authorities and their neighbours know at least 24 hours before lighting up. You can notify your intention to burn by visiting www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or for Northern Tablelands residents phoning 1300 141 119.

"Bush and grass fires can strike at any time and it is vitally important for residents and land managers to be prepared.

"This means doing simple things like cleaning your gutters, removing combustibles from your yard, ensuring hoses can reach all corners of your property and updating and discussing your bush fire survival plan, so you and your family know what you will do in the event of a bush fire.

"Helpful information about preparing and what to do in the event of a fire are contained in the Bush Fire Survival Plan and Farm Fire Plan guides available on the NSW RFS website.
